EYFS OUTSIDE LEARNING PROJECT FACT SHEET USING THE LOCAL LIBRARY (3 – 5 age range)



Key activities:

- Making planned trips to the library that include an environmental walk
- Mapping the library walk
- Choosing fiction and non-fiction books linked to topics and children's current needs and interests
- Developing children's interest in books by talking with them about what they are choosing
- Developing parental awareness of the value of the local library and selecting favourite authors and reading books with children

Extracts from the new statutory educational programmes that can be also be developed through regular library visits:

Communication and language: Reading frequently to children, and engaging them actively in stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems, and then providing them with extensive opportunities to use and embed new words in a range of contexts, will give children the opportunity to thrive.

Literacy: It is crucial for children to develop a life-long love of reading. Reading consists of two dimensions: language comprehension and word reading. Language comprehension (necessary for both reading and writing) starts from birth. It only develops when adults talk with children about the world around them and the books (stories and non-fiction) they read with them, and enjoy rhymes, poems and songs together.

Understanding the world: Understanding the world involves guiding children to make sense of their physical world and their community. The frequency and

range of children's personal experiences increases their knowledge and sense of the world around them – from visiting parks, libraries and museums to meeting important members of society such as police officers, nurses and firefighters. In addition, listening to a broad selection of stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems will foster their understanding of our culturally, socially, technologically and ecologically diverse world.
